
Hi, Dear Members,

Dude Ranch Expert Lynn Downey to Speak October 11 ***Dress Like a Cowgirl: Dungarees, Jeans, Boots***

Marin County native Lynn Downey will tell us about the deep connection dude ranches have to the culture and history of the American West in her illustrated talk on October 11 at noon.



Lynn is an award-winning author and historian. She is the former historian for Levi Strauss & Co. and the author of *Levi Strauss: The Man Who Gave Blue Jeans to the World*. In 2019 she published *Arequipa Sanatorium: Life in California's Lung Resort for Women*, a history of the TB sanatorium, formerly at the site of the Arequipa Girl Scout camp in Fairfax. Her book won an award for Scholarly Non-Fiction.

She is also a novelist, and her debut historical novel *Dudes Rush In* won a Will Rogers Medallion Award. She is working on the sequel, which will be called *Dude or Die*.

Lynn writes the blog *Tumblrreads: A New Twist on the Old West*.



Member Wonders If Mid-Fifties CMWIC Helped Her Busy Mother Cope

During summer of 2022, I was going through a little keepsake box containing the dear letters my mother wrote to me when I went away to college in 1964. In the box was a bundle of bank checks written by my mother from 1952 onward.



To my amazement they included what were annual membership checks in the amount of \$4.00 made out to the "Corte Madera Woman's Improvement Club!" I realized that her four children were all very young at that time she wrote the checks (she had four of us in a five-year period) and that she and Dad were in the midst of rebuilding the little house they purchased on Chapman Drive in 1946 to accommodate a family of six.

Dad (Charles Arthur Rowe) was an engineer with Standard Oil of California and was involved in many civic activities, including helping to build the CM Community Center, which the CMWIC now calls home. He was also a member of the newly formed Lions Club, was on the CM Town Council and the board for construction of the new Marin

General Hospital and rebuilding the Redwoods Presbyterian Church.

So, I was glad to know that Mom was able to somehow break away from all her home responsibilities to meet with other women in the post-war years of the rapidly growing Corte Madera community.

(The dues were \$4.00 per year. Dues today would be more than \$40 per year if they had risen with inflation, so \$25 is a bargain!)

"Understanding Our Transgender and Non-Binary Friends and Family Members"

The world is changing fast, and no area more so than what we (mis-?) understand as gender. Pronoun usage - she, he, they - used to be simple and automatic but now a growing number of teens are identifying as non-binary or transgender.

Our speaker/facilitator, Lolma Olson, will help us understand more about the terms "transgender," "non-binary," and "queer" and help us identify our judgments/assumptions.



Lolma was the director of Patient Relations at California Pacific Medical Center in San Francisco and was CEO of her own business, Sage Consulting, working with large hospital systems.

Now that she is retired, she is a volunteer for Trans Heartline House, a medical recovery house in Marin; she facilitates small groups for her Senior LGBTQ community on "Understanding Our Transgender Friends" and is the co-chair of the North Bay LGBTQ Social Committee. She lives with her wife, Beth – together for thirty-six years – in Novato.

Lolma will present information, then open the floor for Q & A. This program will be informative and participants will leave with a better understanding of people who live as transgender – non-binary – queer people.
